Business changes include:

- Total Body Transformation Boot Camp which was sold and rebranded by the new owners to AscendFit.
- Moonlight Tattoo re-opened after nearly a year of closure.
- Nicola Johns Pharmacy has discontinued prescriptions and has rebranded to The Probiotics Store.
- Kebab Kitchen has sold and been rebranded to Daaku Kebab.
- Glen Innes Family Centre are moving into the building previously occupied by Glen Innes Health Centre





It is exciting to see some TRC related changes happening in Glen Innes including the pending opening of Glen Innes Everybody Eats on Line Rd and the redevelopment of Taniwha Reserve (photo on left)

133 Line Road has been completely renovated into a food court and was awaiting tenants, but is now undergoing more renovating to become 'Everybody Eats', a facility where people can eat and pay whatever they can. The upstairs area has been converted into an art studio.

The former university campus has been sold to developers and will be developed into 1500 residential apartments housing 6,000 people (the same as the population of Warkworth).

The apartment buildings include one 18 storeys high. Also intended is a 7-level car park building. Please feel free to contact the GIBA office if you would like to see plans.

Our Pacific Warden, Lopeti Maupese, has continued to do a great job providing a security presence in the town centre each evening. Lopeti is very highly regarded by the retailers and also by our local Community Policing Team. Lopeti patrols Monday – Wednesday between 4pm and 8pm, and from 6pm-10pm on Thursday and Friday nights.

We have initiated a Security Forum, a group of about 20 including representatives from Glen Innes Police, Auckland Council, Auckland Transport, and security operators that work in the area, such as community patrols, Armourguard, Maori wardens and Pacific Wardens. The group meets once every two months and discusses all security related matters concerning Glen Innes only. We now have 36 CCTV cameras, and our ongoing plan is to continue to add to the network each year.

Our appreciation goes out to our key partners for their ongoing support – Maungakiekie-Tamaki Local Board, Tamaki Regeneration, and Auckland Council representatives who work with us on environmental services and public asset maintenance.
